



Ihedioha will make PDP true shining light in governance of Imo —Secondus





Prince Uche Secondus is the national chairman of the Peoples Democratic Party (PDP). He is a very experienced and dogged politician whose tentacles straddle the length and breadth of Nigeria, overseeing the large-scale network of the party in every nook and cranny of the country. In this interview, he speaks of the newly elected governor of Imo State in glowing terms and expresses confidence that Imo people are set to enjoy excellent governance under Emeka Ihedioha. Excerpts by MAJEED BAKARE:

How do you describe Emeka Ihedioha in terms of his political ascendancy?

Governor- Elect Emeka Ihedioha is one of the rising stars that give hope to the country that the future still holds some promise. I have followed his politics closely as a friend and an associate and I have every confidence that he would do well in his new challenges. He has pragmatic approach to politics that I believe will take him far. His network is perhaps the biggest asset in his bag as I hope he would tap on them greatly. Even though young, Hon. Ihedioha is tested and exposed in his politics and these factors will come handy as he takes the mantle of leadership of his state.

Do you think he will be impeded in fulfilling his campaign promises?

I don't think so because he approaches politics with some sincerity. Those who face problem with their campaign promises are those who fake and make impossible promises just to win votes. Emeka is not that type. He is a good tailor who cuts his cloths to size and to his

What are your expectations of his government in 100 days, one year and two years respectively?

In 100 days I expect him to have retrieved Imo state from the confusion of the last 8 years and begin to focus it for the needed direction. There is a lot of clearing to do so even his first one year would still be channeled to restoring

What would be your advice to him? Emeka is my friend and brother we share much about abuse of power and I know he would adhere to our philosophy. Power is like marriage, if you bring God into your marriage you will have peace and record successes, the same here, if Emeka remains focused on God in prayer for direction, everything good will fall in and I strongly believe he will.

How would the PDP help Ihedioha succeed as governor?

Of course, the party is there for him; PDP is number one adviser to all our elected leaders, particularly state governors. We watch over them, we monitor them closely and come in where necessary. You notice that in the last four years only PDP governors performed; only in PDP states that projects were being commissioned. In eight years of APC in Imo state, President Muhammadu Buhari was never invited to commission any project, the only state they had in the south-east region. Under PDP Ndi Imo will experience project commissioning by God's grace.

Do you think the APC being the ruling party at the centre and opposition in Imo will present significant challenge to Ihedioha in government?

I don't envisage any APC challenge because the party has been an aberration in the state. The people of Imo have always been PDP even when APC was hibernating in government house. The enthusiasm that greeted PDP's victory shows clearly the mood of the people iust liberated from bondage. With PDP Imo is returning to the true tenets of democracy, government of the people for the people and by the people.

What is the expectation of the party for Ihedioha as governor of Imo State?

PDP's expectation of Hon Ihedioha as Governor of Imo is simple: deliver democracy dividends to the people in such a manner that the people of Imo state will experience the difference between light and darkness. My plea is for the people of Imo to give him all the needed cooperation he requires to suc-



Ihedioha will provide real jobs for Imo people —Senator-elect

Hon. Ezenwa Onyewuchi is the senator-elect for Owerri zone. He won the elections after serving two terms in the House of Representatives. In this interview, he speaks of how the PDP managed to secure victory in the governorship election against the APC/AA combined and expresses high optimism that the governor-elect, Emeka lhedioha, will do very well in office. Excerpts by LIZZY CHIRKPI:

How did the PDP pull off the upset against the incumbent governor Rochas Okorocha and his protégé in the AA?

Let me state it: it was not an upset- Imo

is a PDP state. A few things happened in the past and PDP 'lost' elections, but if you look at it, even when we did not produce the governor, we had most of the seats at the National Assembly level, so that shows you that PDP is on ground in Imo state. And in this election, if you are aware and abreast of the happenings in Imo, you will also see that the PDP worked very hard; the PDP put its house in order. The bane of PDP in the past elections have been internal bickering, lack of internal democracy, but this time, we conducted the most transparent primary ever, not only in Imo, but across the country, so, those who lost out in the primary knew that that was the will of our party members, and as such, some of them keyed in; most of er reckoned with the dignity of labour, no them keyed in and supported the winners infrastructure was put in place, the few of the primaries. And in the build up to the election, PDP worked very hard, the few months, so what kind of government other political parties in Imo, I never saw them on the field, I never met anyone on my way to the campaigns, and on my way back. I only met PDP candidates; the other candidates were waiting for the writing of results and federal might to win elections but we kept talking to our people (and) they understood the PDP message, and voted for PDP at all levels. The message is good governance; we preached the message of a new Imo, a new Nigeria. They also could see people they can trust, it a trust issue. When you look at people who ran elections in PDP, you will see that these

are people that can be trusted, according to their antecedents and performance. If you look at the people we fielded, they are people that have done well in their previous assignments, as you know, the reward for good work, is more work: that is what

Aside from trust, what is the plan for

the people of Imo state? Let me say this: the outgoing government of Rochas Okorocha as you can see and observe did not do well in Imo- this election is a vote of no confidence on Rochas Okorocha because Okorochas was the man that actually contested the election, not Uche Nwosu. Now, this is a government that has no respect for the Imo people; this is a government that was based on deceit; this is a government that never paid salary as at when due; that nevroads he built got washed away after a is that? So it's a case of resisting the emergence of the governor's preferred candidate, Uche Nwosu. And at the same time, PDP also produced the best candidate, in the person of Ihedioha. Ihedioha was the most prepared candidate and the most experienced of all the governorship candidates; he is the only one the people can trust, so the issue is about trust, and the people did not look back on the choice of Emeka Ihedioha. And we can see that he won massively, especially in Owerri Zone; I think he won 101 wards out of the 104 wards, so that is a huge endorsement, and

a huge vote of confidence by his senatorial zone and based on that he moved into Orlu Zone and he was able to win a few local governments in Orlu, and if you put that together, that is massive, and today, he is the governor-elect of Imo state.

Describe the man Ihedioha?

Ihedioha is very well brought up. When you look at the way he has carried himself, you can attribute it to his upbringing, properly brought up, and went to school, you know that school has a way of taming you, and he is a man that is focused, he is hard working, and he is honest to a large extent, has sincerity of purpose, and very well driven. And if you work with him, you will also know that he is a man that has capacity, capacity to win and capacity to deliver. And he is a man I do not think he will go into deceiving the people, he lives modest life style, and I know he will not be into accumulation of wealth. And I am sure he will use Imo money to develop Imo.

The name Ihedioha resonates with legislature, how do you now foresee the transition to the executive?

If you recall, Ihedioha started from the executive, he was special assistant to the former vice President, Atiku Ababakar who is the presidential candidate of the PDP so he also has the benefit of executive experience. If you put together the executive and the legislative experience, there is no doubt that he will do remarkably in all assignments. I worked with him when he was deputy speaker: a cerebral leader, a committed leader, a trust worthy leader, and a reliable leader, and I have no doubt that there would be a new paradigm in Imo, and the people will be better for it.

What advice would you offer the governor-elect?

Okorocha came in through popular support but fretted everything away; he lost the goodwill he came in with. I will advise Ihedioha to be mindful of those pitfalls and also to do the right thing and do the needful and remain who he is and to ensure that he discharges creditably as the governor of Imo state. I have no doubt in my mind that he will do credibly well.

There are reports that the outgoing governor is making recruitments into the civil service, how do you envisage this will be resolved in the incoming administra-

It's very unfortunate that the outgoing governor is setting landmines for the incoming governor. A man who never recruited people into the civil service, all of a sudden he is recruiting people at the twilight of his administration. It smacks of insincerity; an attempt to ensure that the governor that is coming after him does not succeed but I can assure you that the matter will handled by Ihedioha, we will look at the processes of the recruitment, where he has not followed due process, the law will take its cause. Ihedioha will provide jobs for the people of Imo, the teeming vouths of Imo, but when due process was not followed, I'm sure the civil service rule has a means of addressing such anomalies. I'm sure that at the right time, the new government will provide jobs for the population. Imo has a vibrant work force, a vibrant population, and the governor will come up with ingenious ways of creating job for the army of unemployed youths in

Given the enormous challenges in Imo, how could Ihedioha play significant role in the affairs of PDP or would he just

Ihedioha is a politician and as somebody who emerged through a political party, he has a duty and a responsibility to ensure the survival of that political party that got him into the position which he occupies. I do not foresee a situation where he will ignore the party that got him into power. The party remains the party and government remains government, and from time to time they will complement each other, but the business of the party should be separated from business of government. Ihedioha is in a position to understand what he needs to do, give respect to the party and rule the government.

Ihedioha will be a blessing to Imo -Nwawuba

Hon. Henry Nwawuba is the member representing Mbaitoli/Ikeduru federal constituency in the House of Representatives and a staunch ally of the newly elected governor of Imo State. In this interview conducted ahead of the swearing-in of Rt. Hon. Emeka Ihedioha, he speaks of the leadership trait and expectations of the new helmsman. Excerpts by LIZZY CHIRKPI.

As someone who has worked closely with Emeka Ihedioha, how would you describe the man?

In exactly three weeks and five days from now Imo State will be witnessing a dawn of a new era, Rt. Hon. Emeka Ihedioha would be sworn in as next executive governor of Imo State. He has had a catch phrase as far as I know him: his word is his bond. That's the best description of Emeka Ihedioha because he is apt and everything is embodied in that catch phrase. A man that when he has agreement he keeps to that agreement with high sense of responsibility. I think he's really going to be a blessing for Ndi-Imo.

How would you describe his leadership style?

Since I have known his Excellency, Emeka Ihedioha,I have noted that he runs an inclusive style of leadership. He consults even to a fault where everybody is given a sense of belonging. He is very strategic, forward and involved in long term plans. He is a man that runs a marathon not hundred meters. He would always make everyone that comes around him politically feel like they have something to offer.

Politically, I think he's a guru because despite all the kind of politics that was played in the National Assembly yet his Excellency Ihedioha still came up on top. While in the House, he chaired one of the grade 'A' committee- Marine Transport committee and from there he became Whip of the House and then leadership came up. He always plays politics with all sense of understanding. Since 1999 Emeka Ihedioha has never done anything else outside politics. He does not even own a company name so has devoted all his time to politics and it has played out for him.

How well do you think his political





background will bear on the governance of Imo state?

I always think that before people go into governance (in the executive) they should have taste of the legislature. The governor-elect coming from the background of a legislator; I think Ndi-Imo should expect rule of law under his administration. We can also expect a vibrant and thriving state legislature under him and we can also expect a vibrant local government system with constituted councils. If you look at Ihedioha's political career, you will agree with me that everything has been preparing him for a position like this over time. Recall that in 2015 Imolites voted for him en-mass but he was robbed and this time around God has answered the prayers of Ndi-Imo. I think all of these would build up to how he is going to be relating with the people.

Do you think he'd have some difficulties delivering on his campaign promis-If you took a snap shot of when gov-

ernor Rochas Okorocha took over Imo

and a take snap shot now that Ihedioha is about to take over, you would realise that we are inheriting a lot of baggage and the terrain is going to be rough. I have also been with him at several fora and he is always passionate about discussing the challenges of the State. We have to close the infrastructure gap in Imo; I believe that working in close relationship with members of the national assembly would close all these infrastructural gaps. It is also important that we have federal government presence in our State, if not for anything, our schools, roads and hospitals and other critical basic human development infrastructures. You would agree with me that Ihedioha is highly experienced and connected.

Without any strings attached and in a very objective sense what advice would you give to him going forward?




And how do you think stakeholders like yourself in the national assembly can help him succeed?

For me, it underscores your tenacity, consistency and God's unfailing commitment to his desire for you to serve the people of Imo State in the capacity as Governor.



Hon. Bede Ekeh is the member representing Aboh Mbaise/Ngor Okpala federal constituency in the House of Representatives. In this interview, he speaks of the capacity and preparedness of Emeka Ihedioha, the new governor of Imo State, to deliver good governance. Excerpts by LIZZY CHIRKPI:



How would you describe the governor-elect in person of Emeka Ihedioha in one sentence?

Of course as you well know I succeeded him and he represented us for 12 years. He is someone I know very well and I'm happy that such a person is coming into Imo at this critical time. However, in one sentence, I would like to say 'he is a very straight forward man, his word is

This is the first time an Mbiase person would emerge as governor of Imo State, how do you feel about it?

It is not about Mbaise here; it is about the people of Ndi-Imo; common, we are not trying to be clannish here. Yes the governor-elect is from Aboh Mbiase but he is the governor of Imo people. However, there's nothing wrong that when you win an election your people would be happy, your family members would be happy and also your friends. What are your expectations of his govern-

tell the world I'm not owing anyone and just the other day Zenith Bank comes out to say, you are owing us N10 billion. So he doesn't even know the enormity of the challenges until he gets in

How do you think he can overcome all these challenges?

Well, Ihedioha would have to think outside the box, we are not saying it would be rosy but God would be with him.

How can you lawmakers from Imo State assist his government to succeed?



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Who is Emeka Ihedioha?

Emeka Ihedioha was born in 1965 and hails from Mbutu, Aboh Mbaise Local Government Area of Imo State, Nigeria. He began his primary education at Town School, Mbutu in Aboh Mbaise Local Government Area of Imo State, completed same at SDA Primary School, Abule Oja, Yaba Lagos in 1976. He then moved on to St. Ephraim's Secondary School, Owerrinta in present day Abia State for his secondary education, rounding off his academic sojourn in Nigeria with a Bachelor of Science (B. Sc.) degree in Food Technology from the University of Lagos. This was in 1988. He has also since taken courses at Stanford University and Harvard University, respectively, both in the United States of America as well as Oxford University Business School, London School of Economics and the University of British Columbia, Canada.

Sojourn to the National Assembly

Ihedioha's first taste of the National Assembly came in 1992 when he emerged as Press Officer to the then President of the Senate, Dr. Iyorchia Ayu. Within three months of this appointment, he was promoted to the position of Chief Press Secretary to the Deputy President of the Senate, Senator Albert Legogie, now late.

Following the truncation of democracy by the military in 1993, Ihedioha returned to his public communications practice as Chief Executive Officer of First Page Communications. In 1995, he became Director of Publicity of the People's Democratic Movement (PDM) which later metamorphosed into the Peoples Democratic Party (PDP) alongside four other organizations.

Following the return to democratic rule in 1999, Ihedioha again found relevance. First, he was appointed Special Assistant to the Presidential Adviser on Utilities (July 1999); Special Assistant on Media and Publicity to the President of Senate (November 1999); and eventually Special Assistant on Political Matters to the Vice President (September 2001). It was from this last assignment in the Office of Vice President Atiku Abubakar that he contested election and won a seat into the House of Representatives as Member representing Aboh Mbaise/ Ngor Okpala Federal Constituency of Imo State in 2003 under the platform of

12 years of sterling legislative achievements:

During his spell at the House of Representatives from 2003 to 2015, Ihedioha recorded tremendous achievements in his legislative duties in Abuja and in enhancing the fortunes of his constituency back home.

First International Maritime Summit: Ihedioha was the Chairman of the House Committee on Marine Transport between 2003 and 2007. In April, 2004, he convened the first International Maritime Summit, in Abuja, an event that brought together for the very first time to the shores of Nigeria, international and local resource persons in the maritime sector. Among the dignitaries that attended the summit were the then Vice President of Chairman, House Ad-Hoc Committee Nigeria, Atiku Abubakar, then Secretary General of IMO, late Admiral Mike

several personalities. The Summit provided a veritable opportunity to chart the much-needed road-map for the advancement of the sector that had suffered due to lack of statutory support.

Adherence to International Conventions: Ihedioha led the way in ensuring that Nigeria complied with International Maritime Organization (IMO) Conventions and that these conventions became part of our Municipal Laws, through their domestication. These laws include:

- The International Convention for the Safety of Life at Sea (Ratification and Enforcement) Act 2004
- The United Nations Convention on Carriage of Goods by Sea (Ratification and Enforcement) Act,
- The International Convention for the Prevention of Pollution from Ships (Ratification and Enforcement) Act
- The International Convention on the Civil Liabilities for Oil Pollution Damage (Ratification and Enforcement) Act, 2006
- International Convention on the Establishment of an International Fund for the Compensation for Oil Pollution Damage 1979 as amended (Ratification and Enforcement) Act,
- International Ship and Port Facility Security (ISPS) Code

Under his watch, two key legislations which reformed the maritime industry to allow for increased participation of Nigerians were passed. The legislations are: the Nigerian Maritime Administration and Safety Agency (NIMASA) Act, 2007 and the Merchant Shipping Act, 2005. It is worthy to add that he also personally sponsored and facilitated the passage into law of the bill that established the Council for Regulation of Freight Forwarding (CRFFN) in Nigeria. It must be satisfying to him to see what NIMASA has become as a vibrant and important agency of government today.

Chief whip of the House: Following a brief stint as the first Chairman, House Committee on Cooperation and Integration Ihedioha was later elected Chief Whip of the House. He held that position from 2007 – 2011.

In his capacity as Chief Whip, Ihedioha served as Chairman of various Ad-Hoc Committees of the House, including Chairman, Ad-hoc Committee on Constituency Projects (2007-2008); Chairman, Ad-Hoc Committee on the Celebration of Ten Years of Unhindered Legislative Practice in Nigeria (1999-2009); Chairman, Ad-hoc Committee on Process and Procedure for Obtaining Local and Foreign Loans; and Chairman, Sub-Committee on the Review of Police

Tenure as Deputy Speaker: On the 6th day of June, 2011 Ihedioha was elected unopposed as the Deputy Speaker of the House of Representative by his colleagues even though the PDP had zoned the position to a different region of the country. The principled stand of the House members was seen as an affirmation of implicit confidence in the leadership credentials of Ihedioha.

Chairman House Committee on Constitution Review: As Deputy Speaker, Ihedioha served as on Legislative Agenda. However, it was his role as Chairman House Ad-Hoc Akhigbe and Obi of Onitsha among | Committee on Constitution Review

that really exemplified his sterling qualities. Under his leadership, the constitution amendment process progressed remarkably with new innovations to make it a bottom-up exercise that placed a premium on the wishes and aspirations of the people. The Committee and indeed, the House, made a landmark record of amending 71 Sections of the Constitution, which if adopted as part of Nigeria's Constitution would have represented the single largest amendment of any Nigerian Constitution in history. The highlight of the process was the highly acclaimed Peoples Public Sessions held all over the country on November 10, 2012. This was a landmark achievement as Nigerians in their various constituencies had an opportunity to express their views on how they should be governed.

Constituency Projects: Throughout his stay at the National Assembly, Emeka Ihedioha attracted and facilitated several infrastructure projects and development programmes to his immediate constituency, Imo State and the South East geo-political zone at large. These include interstate and intra city roads, power transmission/injection stations, vocational/training centres, healthcare facilities, schools, telecommunications, and so on.

It is to Ihedioha's credit that the federal government embarked on the dualization of the Owerri-Elele road (Imo-Rivers state) and the construction of the 59 km, Mbaise ring road as well as the Isinweke-Ihitte Uboma-Okigwe road just to mention a few.

In the area of capacity building, Ihedioha used personal and official contacts to facilitate the empowerment of several women and youths through skills acquisition, scholarship and trading support.

International Engagements

As Deputy Speaker, Ihedioha was the Leader of Nigeria's parliamentary delegation to the Third Legislative Session of the ECOWAS Parliament (2011 - 2015). He also doubled as the Deputy Leader of the Nigerian delegation to the Inter Parliamentary Union (IPU) between 2011-2015.

In the 6th National Assembly,

Ihedioha was at the head of several delegations of the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association (CPA) to many Commonwealth nations in Africa, Europe, Asia and the Pacific, in his capacity as the President of the Nigeria chapter of

CPA. He was the Leader of the Nigerian Delegation to the 6th General Assembly of the International Parliamentary Association for Information Technology, Sofia, Bulgaria, 2008; Member, Executive Committee of the CPA, Africa Region; and Leader, Nigerian Delegation to the 41st CPA, Mpumulangha, South Africa.

Ihedioha holds the national honour of Commander of the Order of the Niger (CON). He is a Fellow of the Chartered Institute of Shipping and also received the Distinguished Service Award of the Nigerian Institute of Public Relations. He was voted one of Nigeria's 50 Most Outstanding Legislators (1999-2009) and has also been conferred with the Fellowships of the Nigerian Institute of Food Science and Technology and Institute of Chartered Mediators and Conciliators (ICMC).

He also holds several traditional titles and is a Knight of the Order of St. Christopher of the Anglican Communion.





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Meet Gerald Irona, Imo State Deputy Governor

t. Hon. Engr. Alphonsus Gerald Irona, Chemical Engineer by training, was born to the family of Irona, Okorua of Umuoyata village, Oguta and Nwayiafor Irona (nne) Uneanya, on August 1st, 1966.


As a young man of promise caught out for greatness, Hon. Irona Alphonsus Gerald ventured into politics and during his early years in politics, was elected a two-term Councilor representing Oguta Ward A in 1996 and 1997 respectively. Later in 1998, he became the youngest State Secretary of the All Peoples Party (APP), which later became all Nigeria Peoples Party

In 1999, Hon. Irona contested and won a seat in the Imo State House of Assembly to represent Oguta State Constituency. During the period, he was Chairman of the House Committee on Petroleum, Environment and Energy; a position he used to conceptualize, initiate and midwife the first ever Memorandum of Understanding between Oil Companies operating in Imo State and their host Communities, notable among which were: the Nigeria Agip Oil Company (NAOC) and Oguta/Etekwuru Communities; Chevron Oil Company Izombe/ Rumuekuneke communities, Addax Petroleum Limited and Izombe/Ezi-Orsu communities.

Hon. Irona, as a result of his robust contributions in the state legislature (Imo State House of Assembly) was appointed member, Presidential Committee on Verification of Oil Wells in the Niger Delta, where he made enormous and spectacular contributions to the process of the identification, demarcation and return of ceded Oil Wells in Egbema and Oguta Oil fields back to Imo State.

He was also one of the pioneer vanguards for the establishment of the 13% Oil Derivation, which later metamorphosed into Imo State Oil Producing | Irona Areas Development Commission (ISOPADEC). 

Ihedioha and the Task Ahead

fter eight years of 'Iberiberism', a meaningless term which nonetheless could be interpreted as in-yourface cronyism and total disregard for process and the rule of law, the people of Imo State expect a new lease of life beginning from today as Hon Emeka Ihedioha takes over from Chief Rochas Okorocha as their Governor. For Ihedioha, the public expectation is huge even with all the landmines that have been laid by his predecessor. But he also has a unique opportunity to make a difference in the lives of the people of a state that has been badly governed.

Governor Ihedioha, as he becomes today, has set out an ambitious agenda for revamping several critical sectors with the mission to "rebuild, reposition and transform Imo state into a modern ecosystem for agriculture, education, health, industry, tourism, sports, entertainment, human capital development, science and technology; thereby creating an enabling environment for sustainable economic growth and quality life for our people". He will need all the help and resources he can get to accomplish that task. Fortunately, he has in Hon. Irona Alphonsus Gerald a deputy who is both brilliant and cool-headed and will compliment him in the task of repositioning Imo State for peace and prosperity.

The immediate challenge is dealing with the legacy of Okorocha. Last week, the Economic and Financial Crimes Commission (EFCC) revealed how Okorocha fiddled with part of the N8 billion Paris Club Refund from the federal government to assist in the payment of workers' salaries in Imo state. "Within two days, N700 million was withdrawn in cash; N200m on the first day and N500 million on the second day and all these monies were disbursed in a manner that was honestly unpalatable," said the EFCC's South East Zonal Office, Usman Imam, who disclosed further that Okorocha warehoused the money until the election period, apparently in a futile bid to install his son-in-law as successor.

I am sure that the new administration will find a lot more scandals in a state where the main preoccupation in recent years has been to erect monuments to waste and where everything revolved around one family. While

questions should be asked about how Okorocha abused power to feather private interest, Ihedioha and his team must also understand that looking back while running, as conventional wisdom teaches, can also be catastrophic. So, while I have no problem with interrogating the past, the main preoccupation should not be about what Okorocha did or did not do; it should be about changing the paradigm of governance in the state and creating new dynamics. The EFCC should be allowed to complete what

it has started on making Okorocha

accountable for the money of Imo State he held in trust while Ihedioha's efforts are geared towards fulfilling his campaign promises.


On a final note, let me state that I have many friends in public offices across Nigeria, including in the position of governor. Tell us about how the Ihedioha machinery pulled through the governorship campaign?

We visited the 305 electoral wards in the state twice: once before the primary, and another after the primary. No other candidate did that: we were able to interact with ordinary people at the grassroots; we sat down with them in the town halls, in their villages, we discussed with them, we tried to find out what were their expectations, challenges, we were able to harvest their concerns about governance generally in the state, and gave them assurances, and they believed in us. And they deposited their votes, we did not play elite politics, the people themselves were the people who defended their votes, we did not pay anybody money to defend the votes. You can imagine that after the elections, people bused themselves to Owerri; we had over 6,000 people at the INEC's office, chanting songs, saying look, we must have our results, give us our results, the support we enjoyed from the ordinary people is unimaginable, if the result had gone the other way, Imo would have been



The message was that: look, this is your own government, so already, there is concern that this government, the Okorocha government in the state, has performed very badly, the people were alienated, they only hear about government on the radio, it was not reaching them, infrastructures break down, the free education was in the realm of propaganda, workers were not paid as at when due, and when paid, they receive half salaries, pensioners were not receiving anything, and the people said, what kind of governance is this? Let us have a government that will listen to us, that can deliver on the promises; that can deliver democratic dividends, because Rochas came with so much hype and eventually he failed the people. People lost their lands; people lost their properties; Court judgments were disregarded; there was general discontent among Imo citizens and they felt that there must be a change, and they bought into our agenda that we need to retake our state back, and

He is a very honest person very action-driven, very focused, development-oriented, the man who would tell you this and do it.....he is not a politician (in the is not a politician because while politicians will promise you aircraft and not even give you a beetle (Volkswagen beetle), Emeka will tell you, I cannot give you an aircraft but I can give you a bicycle, and people believe him, that is Emeka for you, very honest person, very focused person, very articulate and very deliberate in action, very bold and fearless person.

Beyond honesty, Ihedioha has spent a better party of his political career in the legislature. How is the transition going to be like in the executive?

I do not think it's going to be a difficult one. While as a member of the National Assembly, he was first a principal officer

of the House, being the Chief Whip of the House, before becoming the deputy speaker, and in that positions, there are elements of executive powers, managing people, managing resources, managing conflicts, and I can tell you that the 6th and 7th Assemblies where he was the Chief Whip and Deputy Speaker respectively, those assemblies are still regarded as the best ever that has ever been produced till today. If you ask anybody now that who is the deputy speaker of the House, they would still believe that it is the man with the green cap, because, he glamourised the office; he really gave life to that office, in fact, his accomplishments as the deputy speaker of the House still resonates today. Remember he was the Chairman of the constitutional amendment committee and was able to drive the House to visit every constituency across the country to know their views about the constitutional amendment. Those views were collated and formed the part and parcel of the constitutional amendment proposal. So it (executive) is not a strange area for him. Besides, Rt. Hon. Emeka Ihedioha has this capacity to shop for people with capacity to help him do his job, is not enough to be a Chief executive, but you must have the capacity to shop for the strict sense of the word). I do tell him that he people that will help you to do the job; you cannot do it alone, it is about the people

What should Imo people expect in his first 100 days in office; what are the 3 key areas of impact?

The first thing we discovered during campaign was the dearth of trust in governance; people no longer trust their leaders again because they have been told lies over and over again. The first step is to make the people believe in the new government, make them buy into the new agenda that this government is about them, we will make them believe us, trust us, when you do this, government becomes much more easier. What we discovered during the campaign is that our roads are in terrible situation, our access roads to the rural areas,



these are not issues you will carry out all at once, but there are critical access roads that we must address. If it rains today, the whole street will be flooded, there are several roads that when you open them up, it will ease traffic, the roads are already there, but they are in bad shape. We should be able to take care of small roads; we should be able to create access. Secondly, Rochas claimed he built 27 hospitals across the state which is a fallacy; what we saw during the campaign was block works, none of the 27 hospitals is functioning. Today Imo has no primary hospital that is functional, that is why you can hardly find a bed space at the Federal Medical Center Owerri. Our people are suffering, people die of minor diseases that could be solved by doctors, so one of the issues we must address is primary health care services, if we are able to get them working, people can have access, so that the burden on FMC could be less. So these are the three key areas that are important and we are going to address them. As it is, Rochas is busy creating problems for us, he is employing people into public service, last week he employed over 300 people in one of the agencies of government, and backdated it to 2016, giving command promotions, he wants to do that this week, he is trying to pull funds out of the state, from banks, under fictitious guise, put debt upon the incoming administration, we have the issue of labour issue, how do you reconcile that people who are just employed a month to the end of a government, will you sack them?

What will you advise the government

It is a problem the government must find a way around; we must be transparent in what we are doing, we must give justice, but we must be transparent and deliberate, no government can succeed by leaning to sentiment, we must be deliberate, if the actions he has taken so far are legitimate, and backed by law, well and fine, but if they are

a potentially rich state if the resources available are properly harnessed and properly channeled our young men and women are very skilled; when you talk about unemployment, people are looking at government work, unemployment are of different types, an artisan can be unemployed if there are no constructions going on anywhere, he is unemployed, a carpenter can be unemployed if there are no jobs to do, a graduate can be unemployed if there are no government jobs to do. It is a general problem, but when you create an enabling environment for small businesses to thrive, unemployment will go down, under this administration, he (Okorocha) spent billions to import desks for primary school students from China. imported school uniforms from China, imported shoes from China, if he had given these contracts to our carpenters in Imo state, they will buy the wood from Benin, bring it to Owerri, they would employ extra hands to assist, the woman selling puff puff, people will patronize her, the women selling pour water, people will patronize her, the people who sell fuel, they will gain, because they will buy fuel into the generators to work, people who will load the desk inside buses will get engaged, the only thing our people got was offloading those items; he has denied our people employment and tax, because if you give somebody contract, he will pay tax, you imported these things at your own price, it was not competitive, the people were not given value for their money, if you give people contract, people will pay their dues, people will be engaged, revenue will be generated, several businesses have left Imo state because of insecurity, if there is security, people will bring their businesses; for instance, the poultry built by Mbakwe, if that poultry is functional, it will employ between 500-1000 people, outside other ancillary employment that will come out. Government should only employ a limited percentage of the people.

How is Mr. Ihedioha going to handle these issues as they relate to rule of law and liaison with the legislature?

I was privileged to be part of the meeting he held with the newly elected members of the state House of Assembly- PDP members, about 13 of them and he made it clear to them, he is a legislator up till now, is an institution that made him what he is now, and that he is prepared to work with them, that he will respect the separation of powers, he will respect it, and he expects them to respect the principle of separation of power and he will do everything to encourage them, to do the right thing. And he will not fear to scold them when they do the wrong thing, at the same time, he is going to respect the autonomy of local government, he will encourage them to spend their funds within the bounds of the law. 

Ihedioha: From the Green Chamber to Douglas House

hen the Imo state electorate chose the Rt. Emeka Ihedioha their next governor, at the last election, it was a bold statement anchored on an informed judgement. Their action was a clear message that "leadership is a serious business that is sustained by trust and evaluated by its level of responsibility and responsiveness."

These plans, with a few contemporary tweaks, are still profoundly brilliant, far-reaching and rele-

It is imperative to note that any meaningful future programmes and projections could benefit from the values and wisdoms of history, as Nwakanma, has suggested. The late Dr. Sam Mbakwe, for instance, remains a positive reference point in administrative acumen, leadership and development foresight, in the recent history of Imo state.

In fact, it was documented that "At creation in 1976, Imo was completely bare and bereft of infrastructure, on account of the 1967 - 1970 Civil War, which affected most communities in the old Eastern Region. But with Mbakwe's election in 1979, in a period of four years, the state had outpaced even the older counterparts, including those that did not witness the war in terms of development. That deployment of energy and exhibition of committed leadership in piloting the affairs of the state by Mbakwe, is still celebrated by the people, years after his demise. That has also formed the benchmark for assessing successive administrations in the state."

Beyond fashioning a suitable economic template that take Imo state out of the woods, this is the time, Your Excellency, to deploy your leadership skills and talent to unite, mobilize and galvanize the good people of Imo state for the good of the state.

It is already a consensus among the people that Imo needs healing. There is an urgent need to rebuild trust among the people, for them to have faith in your leadership.
